THE AFFIRMATIONS OF HUMANISM: A STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES



WE ARE COMMITTED to the application of reason and science to the understanding of the universe and to the solving of human problems.

WE DEPLORE efforts to denigrate human intelligence, to seek to explain the world in supernatural terms, and to look outside nature for salvation.

WE BELIEVE that scientific discovery and technology can contribute to the betterment of life.

WE BELIEVE in an open and pluralistic society and that democracy is the best guarantee of protecting human rights from authoritarian elites and repressive majorities.

WE ARE COMMITTED to the principle of separation of church and state.

WE CULTIVATE the arts of negotiation and compromise as a means of resolving differences and achieving mutual understanding.

WE ARE CONCERNED with securing justice and fairness in society and with eliminating discrimination and intolerance.

WE BELIEVE in supporting the disadvantaged and the handicapped so that they will be able to help themselves.

WE ATTEMPT to transcend divisive parochial loyalties based on race, religion, gender, nationality, creed, class, sexual orientation, or ethnicity and strive to work together for the common good of humanity.

WE WANT TO PROTECT and enhance the earth, to preserve it for future generations, and to avoid inflicting needless suffering on other species.

WE BELIEVE in enjoying life here and now and in developing our creative talents to their fullest.

WE BELIEVE in the cultivation of moral excellence.

WE RESPECT the right to privacy. Mature adults should be allowed to fulfill their aspirations, to express their sexual preferences, to exercise reproductive freedom, to have access to comprehensive and informed health-care, and to die with dignity.

WE BELIEVE in the common moral decencies: altruism, integrity, honesty, truthfulness, responsibility. Humanist ethics is amenable to critical, rational guidance. There are normative standards that we discover together. Moral principles are tested by their consequences.

WE ARE DEEPLY CONCERNED with the moral education of our children. We want to nourish reason and compassion.

WE ARE ENGAGED by the arts no less than by the sciences.

WE ARE CITIZENS of the universe and are excited by the discoveries still to be made in the cosmos.

WE ARE SKEPTICAL of untested claims to knowledge, and we are open to novel ideas and seek new departures in our thinking.

WE AFFIRM HUMANISM as a realistic alternative to theologies of despair and ideologies of violence and as a source of rich personal significance and genuine satisfaction in the service to others.

WE BELIEVE in optimism rather than pessimism, hope rather than despair, learning in the place of dogma, truth instead of ignorance, joy rather than guilt or sin, tolerance in the place of fear, love instead of hatred, compassion over selfishness, beauty instead of ugliness, and reason rather than blind faith or irrationality.

WE BELIEVE in the fullest realization of the best and noblest that we are capable of as human beings.

Thoughts about Commonly Held Opinions

"The Bible is man's creation inspired by God"

There are so many things in the Bible that are not god-like (like contradictions, flat out untruths, odd commandments, etc.), one wonders where the inspiration came from.

If the creator of the universe really wanted to communicate with us, it is odd that his book doesn't contain one mathematical equation or any discussion of geologic time, the true age of the earth and the universe, evolution, or DNA. If only there were a few things, or one thing, in the Bible that human beings wouldn't figure out scientifically or mathematically until thousands of years later, the idea that it was inspired by an omniscient being would be vastly more credible.

"Atheism is a belief system"

No, but empiricism tempered by reason is a belief system: the belief that we can only distinguish what is true from what is false by the use of our five senses and logic. People choose to believe what their senses and logic tell them, or what dogma and superstition tell them. Most people unfortunately choose the latter.

"Only [about] half of the population is paying income tax."

True, but what did the Congress originally intend when it passed the income tax law? When the modern income tax was enacted in 1913, it applied to fewer than four percent of the population.

Commentary:

So, there you have it: This Judeo-Christian-Islamic God created <u>everything</u>, including the animal kingdom of from 3-30 million species!!

31 And God saw everything that he had made, and, behold, it was very good. And the evening and the morning were the sixth day. Gen. 1:31

And God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it: because that in it he had rested from all his work which God created and made. Gen. 2:2

Commentary:

And everything was good, very good in fact. Hallelujah! And then, on the seventh day, God rested? Why was it necessary for God to rest??.

5 And God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually.

6 And it repented the Lord that he had made man on the earth, and it grieved him at his heart.
7 And the Lord said, I will destroy man whom I have created from the face of the earth; both man, and beast, and the creeping thing, and the fowls of the air; for it repenteth me that I have made them.
8 But Noah found grace in the eyes of the Lord.

Gen. 6:5-8

Commentary:

Supreme Court Skips San Diego Cross Case

The U.S. Supreme Court has decided not to hear a long-running controversy over a 43-foot-tall cross displayed on government property in San Diego.

Americans United welcomed the court's June 25 refusal of the case because the Christian cross is not an appropriate symbol to memorialize deceased veterans of many different faith perspectives.

"Crosses belong in sacred spaces, not on public property," said Barry Lynn, executive director of Americans United, in a press statement. "It's time to move on and create a memorial that honors all the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice for this country."

Litigation over the Mt. Soledad cross has been under way for nearly 20 years. Several federal courts have ruled against its display on public property. In an effort to keep the cross where it is, the federal government acquired the land underneath the structure in 2006.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled last year in *Jewish War Veterans of the United States of America v. City of San Diego* that the religious display violates separation of Church and State. Americans United and other groups filed a friend-of-the-court brief urging the judges to reach that conclusion.

The memorial honoring veterans of World War II does not need to be altered to add religious material, Americans United told a U.S. Senate committee recently.

This space is intended to focus attention on books, authors, subjects and articles that may be of interest to humanists, agnostics, atheists, and freethinkers.

The latest issue of Free Mind (Fall 2012), a publication of The American Humanist Association touts a new book: *Damned Good Company* by Luis Granados. It relates "tales of conflicts between God experts and humanist rebels, from earliest times through today."

I recently downloaded this one to my NOOK Tablet and though I've not yet finished it, I believe it's a "Damned Good Read" for Humanists, Atheists, and Freethinkers.

It's available as an e-book from Humanist Press or Barnes & Noble for \$9.99 plus tax.

In a June 26 letter to the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, AU Legislative Director Maggie Garrett expressed opposition to S.3078, which would add a prayer given by President Franklin D. Roosevelt on June 6, 1944, to the World War Memorial in Washington, D.C.

"The current memorial represents all 16 million men and women who served in our armed forces during WWII, Garrett wrote, "There is no need to alter it so that it only represents one particular point of view of God, causing some veterans to feel excluded."

Garrett noted that the design of the memorial, which has stood for more than 10 years, was selected as part of an open, national competition and was approved by the Department of the Interior and other agencies.

Changing the design of the memorial now, Garrett now, Garrett concluded, would disrespect the entire approval process and would do so for political gain.

At press time, the Energy and Natural Resources Committee had yet to take action on the bill beyond holding a hearing. The measure passed the U.S. House of Representatives earlier this year and was introduced in the upper house by U.S. Sen. Rob Portman (R-Ohio).
